This brief responds to questions received by the EOC, and provides an update on information from the Emergency Operations Center (EOC) and its partner agencies.

COVID-19 Case Count Update

There were no new cases of COVID-19 today. The number of positive cases of COVID-19 in Ketchikan remains at fourteen (14). Of these cases, two (2) individuals had a recent history of travel, and eleven (11) individuals were identified as having been in close contact with an individual diagnosed with COVID-19.

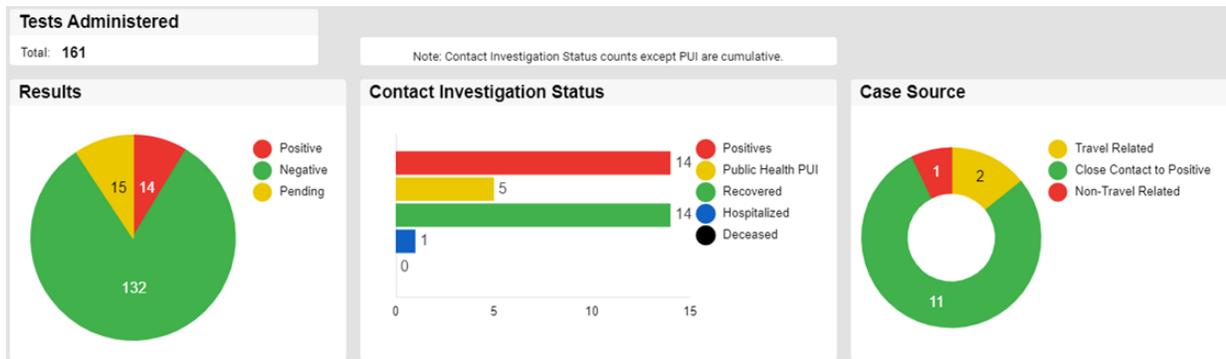

Ketchikan COVID-19 Case Recovery Information
All 14 of the 14 cases have recovered and are no longer being monitored by Public Health.
Criteria for release from monitoring/isolation:
* At least 3 days (72 hours) have passed since recovery defined as resolution of fever without the use of fever-reducing medications and improvement in respiratory symptoms (e.g., cough, shortness of breath); and,
* At least 7 days have passed since symptoms first appeared.

163 tests have been conducted for COVID-19 in Ketchikan, with the following results:

Updates to Governor’s Health Mandates

Tonight Governor Dunleavy issued Health Mandate 013, as well as issued updates to Health Mandates 006, 011, and 012.

Health Mandate 13 supersedes Health Mandate 008, and extends the statewide public and private school closure from May 1, 2020 to the end of the 2019-2020 school year.

Health Mandate 006 on Elective Oral Health Procedures is in effect until rescinded.

Health Mandate 011 on Social Distancing is in effect until April 21, 2020.

Health Mandate 012 on Intrastate Travel, limiting travel between communities, is in effect until April 21, 2020.

Update on Testing Criteria

The Alaska Department of Health and Social Services issues a Public Health Alert today: *Updated Procedures for Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) Testing in Alaska*. Included in the health alert is guidance for testing at Alaska State Public Health Labs with a lower threshold for testing. This is because many patients with COVID-19 present with a very mild illness. Guidance has been recommended to consider testing persons who meet the following characteristics:

- New onset of any one of the following: cough, shortness of breath, or difficulty breathing, OR
- New onset of two or more of the following: chills, diminished sense of taste or smell, diarrhea, fatigue, fever (measured or subjective), headache, muscle/joint aches, nausea, rigors, runny nose, sore throat, or sputum production.

*Alaska State Public Health Laboratory supplies are limited, so please follow the preferred laboratory guidance closely.

Temporary Emergency Homeless Shelter Operations

As was reported in our April 3rd press release, 24-hour homeless services, to replace the First City Homeless Services day shelter and overnight warming center, are now being provided at the Gateway Recreation Center. The Park Avenue Temporary Home (PATH) shelter has also gone to a 24-hour services schedule. Staff from the City and Borough, as well as First City Homeless Services staff, worked together to set up the new shelter at the recreation center. The center is now fully staffed and has been operational since April 7th. The term of the agreement will be through May 15, 2020, or until the end of the Ketchikan Gateway Borough's disaster emergency declaration, whichever occurs later.

Seasonal and Fishing Industry Essential Service Plans

In accordance with the State of Alaska mandates 11 and 12, fishing industry workers that must enter Alaska, or travel between communities within Alaska to begin work on critical infrastructure before their self-quarantine period is complete must submit a plan or protocol for maintaining critical infrastructure to the Alaska Unified Command as soon as possible.

The plan must outline protective measures your business will enact in order to avoid the spread of COVID-19 and not endanger lives in the communities in which you operate, of others who serve as a part of that infrastructure or the ability of that critical infrastructure to function. Plans can be submitted by email to akcovidplans@ak-prepared.com, and use the name of your business at the start of the email subject line, and the start of the file name of any attached files.

Unemployment Updates

As we mentioned in the April 8th media release, we are aware that Ketchikan households and businesses are being hit hard by the increasingly detrimental economic effects of COVID-19. In addition to the programs for businesses, there are also programs and assistance available to individuals who are not working at this time.

Due to the recent COVID-19 emergency measures, the Alaska Unemployment Insurance Program is switching to a single-week filing process. Once you file a new claim, or reopen an existing claim, you must file for payment of benefits the first Sunday through Saturday following your application submission, and then every week following to be eligible for payment.

At this time, the Alaska Department of Labor is still working to incorporate additional benefits from the CARES Act into their system. For those not familiar, the CARES Act creates emergency relief to unemployed workers affected by COVID-19. This act will provide Pandemic Unemployment Assistance to individuals that are self-employed and not eligible for regular Unemployment Insurance (UI) benefits, Federal Pandemic Unemployment Compensation which provides an additional \$600 payment for any eligible week of regular UI benefits, and Pandemic Emergency Unemployment Compensation which provides federal UI payments to someone who has exhausted all of their regular UI benefits. Alaska will continue to update their information concerning the CARES Act once it becomes available.

Social Distancing is Working for Ketchikan

Ketchikan's social distancing efforts are working and we are seeing the positive results with the lack of positive COVID-19 cases this week. We need to stay the course and continue to hunker down. We are strong, and we can do this for a long-term result.

We are not yet looking at relaxing social distancing because we believe there may be people in the community who may have COVID-19 but are early on in the virus and are asymptomatic. It is imperative that folks continue to #hunkerdown, shelter in place, and stay home, in order to contain the spread of COVID-19. Parents are urged to keep children home, not schedule play dates, and avoid group gatherings in public areas.
